Malcolm Green joined the GDIT team in October 2014 following a long and successful career in NATO. A proven leader he has in excess of twenty-five years' experience in the design and acquisition of NATO Communication and Information systems (CIS) and later, in the full Life Cycle of C4ISR.

He was instrumental in defining and executing a number of strategy changing programs for NATO not least the NATO Post 2000 SATCOM Program and the outsourcing of ISAF Mission Communications Information Services (CIS) in Afghanistan together totalling a combined program value of 1.4Bn Euro.



In his last assignment with NATO he led a large team of scientific research and engineering staff developing, acquiring and implementing NATO's Joint Intelligence, Surveillance and Reconnaissance capabilities, a focal program under NATO's new strategic vision following the recent NATO Wales summit.

He takes pride in many of his career achievements but none more so than the Afghan Mission Network - AMN. In 2010 then Commander of NATO and US Forces Afghanistan, General Stanley McChrystal, demanded a mission secret network that all coalition forces were interconnected to empower commanders to "fight off the same map" and share situational awareness.

Building a team that comprised NATO, US and industry partners Malcolm deployed to Kabul for six months to lead and direct the implementation on the ground embedding himself in the command group. The core AMN infrastructure was in place and coalition nations joined the AMN realizing the commander's intent within 20 weeks. The Afghan Mission Network is a total success in terms of shared situational awareness and eliminated fratricide incidents. Today the AMN is the architectural foundation of the NATO Federated Mission Network and the DoD Mission Partner Environment initiatives that will ensure coalition C4ISR capability is ready and in situ to support future coalition missions.
